

National Human Trafficking Awareness Day on January 11 raises awareness of the persistent issue of human trafficking. This day is specifically dedicated to awareness and prevention of the illegal practice. Since the Senate established this day of observance in 2007, it has drawn massive public support from individual donations to government-organized events. The horrific injustice of human trafficking can affect people of any race and background, and on this and every day we are all called to work to end human trafficking wherever it exists. 




# **Human Trafficking Background and Overview**

- Human Trafficking is a \$150 billion world market that impacts an estimated 50 million people worldwide.
- Victims of human trafficking are hidden in our neighborhoods. They are being recruited from our schools. They are growing our food, working in our nail salons, and they are there when we go on vacation and stay in hotels. They are hidden in plain sight.
- This affront to human dignity happens through force, fraud, and coercion.
- Traffickers thrive where vulnerability is high; where people are desperate and their options are limited or nonexistent. People on the move and recent immigrants are at particular risk of exploitation by traffickers because of their precarious social and economic circumstances. The International Organization for Migration estimates the number of international migrants to be at least 281 million people. They are refugees, asylum seekers, labor migrants, and those displaced by conflict or natural disasters. They are fleeing floods, famine, war, violence, endemic poverty, organized crime, political corruption, and the effects of climate change. They are both desperate and resilient. The adverse circumstances that force people to flee their homes can lead migrants to be deceived in exploitative recruitment abroad. Migration routes too often lead migrants into the hands of organized trafficking networks, exploitative employment, or situations of extortion.
- However, immigrants are not the only ones who are forced into a life of servitude. It's happening to our youth in our communities.
- Human trafficking is the fastest-growing criminal industry in the world. It is the second most lucrative and is soon expected to surpass the illegal drug trade. Drugs can be sold once, but people can be sold multiple times, with many victims being sold 15 to 30 times a day.
- Child online sexual exploitation is rampant. Furthermore, it's hard to detect, threatens lives, especially of the most vulnerable, and if unaddressed, will have daunting and irreversible impacts on families and society.





# What Does the Church Say?

- The Catholic Church has a long history of speaking out on the rights of workers officially began with Leo XIII's papal encyclical *Rerum novarum* in 1891.
- The <u>Catholic Church</u> teaches that each person is made in the image and likeness of our God. Human trafficking is an affront to that dignity. Catholic social teaching (CST) further develops this idea through the seven themes of CST found <u>here</u>.
- Written during the Second Vatican Council, the Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World (*Gaudium et Spes*) states "slavery, prostitution, the selling of women, and children, and disgraceful working conditions where people are treated as mere tools for profits rather than free and responsible persons are infamies and supreme dishonor to the creator."
- Pope Francis has spoken out frequently against human trafficking, including his statement last February, on the occasion of the feast of our patron, St. Josephine Bakhita. You can read his comments here.
- Men and women religious have played an integral part in the battle against human trafficking. In 2001, nearly 800 women leaders of the International Union of Superiors General (UISG) passed a resolution dedicating over one million members "to work in solidarity with one another within our own religious communities and in the countries in which we are located to address insistently at every level the abuse and sexual exploitation of women and children..." The Alliance to End Human Trafficking is the United States' response to this call.

## **Talking Points**

- The Alliance to End Human Trafficking (AEHT) is a collaborative, faith-based national network that offers education, supports access to survivor services, and engages in advocacy to eradicate human trafficking. We work to inform the public, prevent this assault on human dignity, and assist survivors to live fulfilling lives.
- Our members include 200+ congregations of Catholic Sisters, coalitions, organizations, and individuals working to end human trafficking.
- Prevention is key to ending human trafficking. Education and advocacy are necessary and women and men who have survived this crime need access to services to help them heal.
- Pope Francis calls human trafficking one of the most troubling of the world's open wounds.
- Many victims come to the United States from other countries where they are promised the American dream of getting an education and finding work only to have their passports confiscated, and fear of their safety or the safety of their family to be compromised. They are taught not to trust law enforcement. Speaking another language further diminishes their ability to seek help. Their dreams are turned into nightmares when they are forced to enter the sex industry, labor on farms, in hotels among other industries for 12 to 14-hour days with no hopes of escaping their new-found life.

Scripture Reading: John 1: 1-5



In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

He was in the beginning with God.

All things came to be through him, and without him nothing came to be.

What came to be through him was life, and this life was the light of the whole human race;

the light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it.

## Reflection on the reading:

We live in a time where it is easy to believe that darkness has overcome light or that it soon will. We can look at a variety of issues, but simply looking at the one issue of buying and selling human beings--human trafficking--it would be easy to believe that the darkness is going to win. But we are a people of hope. This is a year of hope. Focusing on how the light dispels the darkness of human trafficking is how we will continue to help meet its end. Two decades ago, the language and knowledge of human trafficking was barely known. We are part of the people who have brought that information forward--we have shone a light on that darkness. We will continue our work until that darkness is completely dispelled and people are no longer a commodity. It is possible. Keep shining the light.

Let us take a moment and reflect on how each of us can bring light to this issue.

#### **Prayers of Petition:**

God, we ask that you show us what is ours to do to bring light to the offense of human trafficking so that others may not become victims.

For the conversion of hearts of traffickers, we pray.

**February 8, 2024** 

Journeying in Dignity: Listen, Dream, Act

Dear sisters and dear brothers!

Today, the liturgical Memorial of Saint Josephine Bakhita, we celebrate the tenth World Day of Prayer and Awareness against Human Trafficking. I associate myself wholeheartedly with all of you around the world, especially the young, who are working to combat this global scourge.

Together let us walk in the footsteps of Saint Bakhita, the religious Sister from Sudan, who as a child was sold into slavery and was a victim of traffickers. Let us remember the wrong she endured, her suffering but at the same time her strength and her journey of liberation and rebirth to a new life. Saint Bakhita encourages us to open our eyes and ears to see those who go unseen and to hear those who have no voice, to acknowledge the dignity of each person and to fight trafficking and all forms of exploitation.

Trafficking, in fact, often goes unseen. The media, thanks also to courageous reporters, have brought to light modern forms of slavery, but the culture of indifference tends to desensitize us. Let us help one another to be more responsive, to open our lives and hearts to our sisters and brothers who even now are being bought and sold as slaves. It is never too late to take action.

Thank God, many young people have taken up the challenge of this World Day against trafficking. Their enthusiasm and commitment show us the way: they remind us that we are called to listen, dream and act in order to counter trafficking.





# The Alliance to End Human Trafficking

Message from Pope Francis, continued.

**February 8, 2024** 

First, it is essential to listen to those who are suffering. I think of the victims of wars and conflicts, those affected by climate change, those forced to migrate, and those, especially women and children, who are exploited sexually or in the workplace. May we listen to their cry for help and feel challenged by the stories they tell. Together with the victims and the young, let us once more dream of a world where all people can live with freedom and dignity.

Then, sisters and brothers, by the power of the Spirit of Jesus Christ, let us make this dream a reality by taking concrete actions to combat trafficking. Let us pray fervently and work proactively for this cause, the defence of human dignity, whether by prayer and action as individuals and families, or as parish and religious communities, as ecclesial associations and movements, and also in the various spheres of social and political life.

We know that the fight against trafficking can be won, but it is necessary to get to the root of the problem and eliminate its causes. I encourage you, then, to respond to this appeal for transformation, in memory of Saint Josephine Bakhita, who stands for all those men and women who, despite their enslavement, can still attain freedom. It is a call to take action, to mobilize all our resources in combatting trafficking and restoring full dignity to those who have been its victims. If we close our eyes and ears, if we do nothing, we will be guilty of complicity. From my heart, I express my gratitude to everyone engaged in the celebration of this Day, and bless all those who are committed to combatting trafficking and all forms of exploitation in order to build a world of fraternity and peace.

## **Take Action To End Human Trafficking**

## **Take Action To End Human Trafficking**

#### 3. Advocate

- Contact the Governor of your state. Ask them to ensure that the National Human Trafficking Hotline phone number (888–373–7888) and text line (233 733 or BeFree) is featured prominently on all state websites and in all state-run restroom on Interstate highways.
- Work with legal experts and advocacy groups to identify and propose legislative changes that strengthen anti-trafficking laws. Advocate for policies that increase penalties for traffickers, protect survivors, and improve the overall legal framework for combating human trafficking.
- 4. Host a Letter-Writing Party
  - Write your lawmakers to support anti-trafficking legislation
  - Write a letter to the editor to raise awareness and affirm coverage of human trafficking
  - Write local leaders to support anti-trafficking initiatives and raise awareness
  - Contact companies, encouraging them to clean up their supply chains
