



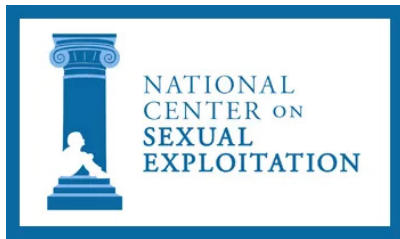

FOCUS: The month's newsletter highlights the Dirty Dozen List published by the National Center on Sexual Exploitation.

What is the Dirty Dozen List?



The Dirty Dozen List is an annual campaign sponsored by the [National Center on Sexual Exploitation](#) that names twelve mainstream entities for facilitating, enabling, and profiting from sexual abuse and exploitation. This campaign has prompted thousands of people to call on government agencies, corporations, and organizations, including Google, Netflix, TikTok, Verizon, Walmart, Hilton, and the United States Department of Defense, to end exploitative practices.

X (formerly Twitter) is foremost for sexual abuse online, amplifying exploitation instead of preventing it. Not only did the platform decide to take “no action” on child sexual abuse material, but it continues to facilitate child abuse, image-based sexual abuse, AI deepfake pornography, prostitution, sex trafficking, and more. Its policies and lack of enforcement make X a safe harbor for abusers and a nightmare for survivors. According to NCOSE, a recent poll of 1,013 U.S. parents, when asked about their child's experience growing up, 62% said they wish that X had never been invented while a similar poll of Gen Z adults (ages 18-27) found 50% wish X (formerly Twitter) had never been invented.



In 2017 and 2018, Amazon was named to the Dirty Dozen list in part because of the sale of child-like sex dolls. For several years, Amazon stopped selling these dolls after advocacy efforts in the United States and other countries; however, these full-bodied sex dolls of both adults and children have returned.



Child safety experts establish that these dolls serve to desensitize adults caught with these child-like sex dolls, and [a report from the Australian Institute of Criminology](#) notes that such dolls risk reinforcing cognitive distortions or the beliefs offenders use to justify viewing or acting on sexual interest in children, and may normalize harmful fantasies rather than mitigate them.

NCOSE requests the following of Amazon:

- Ban the sale of all child-like sex dolls and ensure they cannot resurface through third-party sellers.
- Strengthen the enforcement of policies to detect and remove listings that violate child protection standards proactively.
- Comply with state and international laws that prohibit the sale and possession of child-like sex dolls.

Awareness

Android

Google's Android fails to protect minors, even with its built-in safety features, which parents find difficult to configure. NCOSE is asking Android to implement improved default safety settings for child accounts; these improvements would reach Samsung users through automatic updates, benefiting the approximately 3.9 billion Android OS users worldwide. But unfortunately, Google has refused to implement this common-sense measure.

NCOSE requests:

- Android OS should adopt built-in Communications Safety features that automatically detect and blur sexually explicit images across messaging apps, video calls, file transfers, and shared contact content for all minor accounts.
- Ideally, this would also include preventing minors from sending nude imagery to reduce the risk of creating or distributing child sexual abuse material (CSAM).
- Android should implement OS-level web content filtering that proactively limits minors' exposure to inappropriate content, including pornography, across browsers and apps controlled or influenced by Google (e.g., Chrome, WebView, and apps using Google services).

Snapchat is the #1 platform used to communicate threats among young people who experienced sexual extortion as a minor. Internal documents and whistleblower accounts reveal that reports of abuse are ignored, critical safety fixes were dismissed to protect engagement metrics, and features like My AI have promoted statutory rape.

Technology exists to stop this, yet Snap chooses to look the other way.

*According to documents from a **lawsuit** by the state of New Mexico, internal data from Snapchat shows they were receiving around 10,000 reports of sextortion per month, with many apparently unresolved or uninvestigated. Even accounts with dozens of reports regarding nudes, minors, and extortion remained active for long periods. Also, safety enhancements flagged as critical by internal teams have often been dismissed by upper management due to concerns about cost or potential impacts on user retention, leaving children at great risk.*



Steam

Steam is the most popular gaming platform on the market and hosts thousands of games that contain explicit sexual content. These sexual games sometimes depict egregious violence and abuse, such as a game in which the user plays a master who buys slaves to rape and torture. Estimates show that just under 16 million of those users are under 18, although without meaningful age verification, there's no clear way to know how many kids are playing on adult accounts.

The access that young gamers have to this content is why Steam is on the 2026 Dirty Dozen List. Exposure to "violent X-rated material" **results** in adolescents being more likely to commit sexual aggression later in life. Sexually violent games have real-world effects on real-life victims.

NCOSE requests the following:

- Add a meaningful age verification process that requires all users to confirm that they are 18 or older before they can access sexual content of any kind on Steam. Currently, only users in the U.K. are required to undergo any verification process due to the country's laws.
- Prevent child accounts from being able to view or preview games with sexually explicit content.
- Ban content that normalizes or graphically depicts sexual violence and abuse.

Apple

Stranger connection apps for 12-year-olds.

Sex games for 4-year-olds.

Platforms known for sextortion and abuse recommended for 13 year-olds.



These are just a few examples of how the Apple App Store has passed Apple's supposed safeguards and opened the door to online harm for children.

Apple App Store was named to the 2023 Dirty Dozen list and continues to expose children to online grooming, sextortion, and explicit content by allowing and marketing harmful apps like Snapchat and Roblox to children.

With 87% of teens in the United States as customers, Apple has the tools and influence to lead the fight against exploitation. Yet, instead of leading the charge to protect its youngest users, Apple has allowed harmful apps, deceptive age ratings, and inadequate parental controls to put millions of children at risk, all while profiting in billions from in-app purchases. Parental controls are difficult to set up, and loopholes persist; there are concerns of violating children's online privacy laws, and Apple canceled plans to detect child sexual abuse material. Deepfake nudity and porn apps were able to infiltrate the App Store by stating they were photo-editing tools. These were removed when journalists exposed them.

TikTok

A recent poll of 1,013 U.S. parents found that among kids who currently use TikTok, 57% were doing so before the age of 12. In 2024, TikTok was in the top five platforms where minors reported having an online sexual experience, and the #4 platform where CSAM offenders attempted to establish contact with a child.

TikTok continues to fail at protecting children, letting predators use messaging, comments, and livestreams to groom and exploit minors. Internal documents show the company knew the risks but did too little to stop them. Meanwhile, online pimp "talent agencies" are using TikTok to funnel users into pornographic content creation.

Telegram

In 2025, Telegram surpassed 1 billion monthly active users and was the 7th most popular social platform. It is the third-most-downloaded messaging app worldwide; however, it allegedly employs only 50 full-time content moderators.



Telegram knows that it is a messaging app used by sexual abusers for child sexual abuse material, sex trafficking, sextortion, and deepfake image-based sexual abuse. Yet it continues to operate encryption without real safeguards—all in the name of 'privacy'—disregarding victims' privacy and human rights.

Normally, the National Center on Sexual Exploitation offers recommendations for improvement and invites constructive dialogue with companies to develop solutions for combatting sexual abuse. However, NCOSE states that it has no confidence that Telegram is prioritizing safety. Telegram must radically and transparently overhaul its entire business model—its approach to encryption, moderation, sexual content policies, and reporting. Telegram is so dangerous and such a threat to so many people that NCOSE believes it should be shut down.

TikTok (cont.)

NCOSE requests for improvement:

- Enforce policies and Community Guidelines consistently and thoroughly. TikTok's policies and Community Guidelines are very strong on paper, but enforcement in practice remains a chief concern.
- Turn Restricted Mode ON by default for all minors to reduce exposure to sexual content. As of March 2025, Restricted Mode is OFF by default and requires 5 steps to turn on.
- Provide caretakers and minors with more resources to manage their accounts and enhance safety, such as prompts upon account creation and embedded PSAs throughout the app to teach users to identify and report inappropriate or abusive behavior.
- Halt the LIVE video feature until the emergence of livestreamed child sexual abuse material and adult sexual content currently occurring there can be effectively prevented.
- Remove Direct Message feature for minors.
- Increase the age of default safety settings to 18 years old. All minors deserve protection by default.
- Improve proactive and permanent removal of accounts with posts or comments that are high-risk for promoting the sharing or selling of CSAM.
- Improve proactive and permanent removal of accounts promoting or recruiting for commercial sexual content or activity, such as OnlyFans.
- Adjust Apple App rating from 12+ to 17+ and Google Play from "Teen" to "Mature" to more accurately reflect the content on TikTok

Discord

This is the 5th time Discord is on NCOSE's Dirty Dozen List for being a venue of online sexual exploitation. Discord's design features perpetuate serious harm like sextortion, grooming, child sexual abuse material (CSAM) distribution, and image-based sexual abuse. Discord has been identified by sextortion victims for extortionists communicating threats, and sexual abusers return to Discord repeatedly, due to the company's reputation for lax rule enforcement and dangerous design. Registered sex offenders have been charged with targeting children on Discord.

NCOSE recommends that Discord ban minors from using the platform until it is radically transformed.

Other recommendations by NCOSE include:

- Prioritize image-based sexual abuse (IBSA) and child sexual abuse material (CSAM) prevention and removal
- Develop or improve proactive internal flagging and review process for high-risk activity related to sextortion and grooming
- Rollout "teen-by-default" safety settings with strict age verification standards
- Effectively block minors from joining servers that host sexually explicit content.
- Add features to Parental Controls
- Permanently suspend Pornhub's verified Discord account.

Mark Zuckerberg and Meta

*Documents provided by Meta revealed that over **100,000 children were exploited daily** across its platforms. Amid these revelations, a senior Meta executive called for stronger safety measures after his own 12-year-old daughter received unsolicited nude images, but his plea for action was reportedly ignored by other senior officials.*

To test these risks, investigators created a fake profile of a 12-year-old girl. During the investigation, three men attempted to meet the minor in person and were subsequently arrested, while several other adult males contacted the profile seeking child sexual abuse material (CSAM).

Historically, the National Center on Sexual Exploitation has engaged with Meta platforms and members of the Meta safety team, bringing survivor voices, subject matter experts, and international advocates to the table to lay out suggestions for recommendations. Meta has consistently been slow to act and has provided insufficient responses, given the scale and severity of the harms.

NCOSE no longer offers recommendations to Meta. Instead, NCOSE calls for the following:

- *Congress must remove Section 230 immunity for online sexual exploitation.*
- *NCOSE calls on additional State Attorneys General investigations into Mark Zuckerberg and Meta for appearing to facilitate sexual exploitation, given the long history of extensive sexual abuse problems and whistleblower testimonies reporting both negligence and apparent complicity in facilitating and profiting from engagement generated by potential criminal activities.*

Grok

Grok is an AI chatbot from xAI that uses advanced language-model technology to have conversations, generate content, and even handle text, images, and voice.

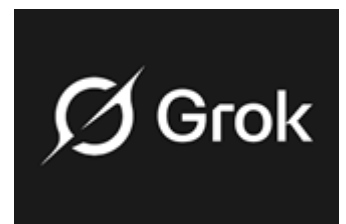
xAI's Grok builds chatbots to normalize rape, sexual violence, and prostitution, sex trafficking, and image generators to create sexual imagery that promotes a culture of abuse. There is no adequate age verification in the United States, and it is therefore available to children. AI companions, sexualized avatars that cater to explicit fantasies, including themes of rape, sexual violence, prostitution, and sex trafficking, rely solely on a self-reported birth year in the app settings, which anyone can change.

Grok's AI-powered image generation tool, "Imagine," allows users to create sexualized and semi-nude imagery. Reports of the tool producing explicit content, including deepfakes of real individuals, highlight its potential for harassment, reputational harm, and abuse. In March 2026, **three teenage girls, two of whom are minors, filed a lawsuit** "alleging that its Grok image generator used photos of them to produce and distribute child sexual abuse material."

Grok can significantly reduce the risks of harm, protect vulnerable users, and align with ethical AI practices. NCOSE requests for improvement include:

- remove the ability to generate sexually graphic content and implement safeguards. Disable the system's capacity to produce sexually explicit or graphic material in both text and image formats.

These changes are essential to ensure the platform prioritizes safety and responsibility over profit and base market appeal.

- implement robust age verification
- constrain model behavior more aggressively. Enforce strict ethical guidelines that limit bot responses to non-explicit topics.
- improve adversarial testing. Implement regular adversarial testing to identify and fix vulnerabilities before they harm users.

Google Chromebooks

As of 2025, education accounts for over 60% of the global Chromebook market share, which includes over 38 million students in K-12 schools worldwide and 93% of school districts in the United States. A survey in 2022 of teens (ages 12-17) found that over 70% saw pornography on school-issued devices.

The problem lies with the Chromebook default settings, with open access exposing them to pornography, violence, sextortion, and cyberbullying. NCOSE placed the Chromebook on the 2023 Dirty Dozen list for this specific reason.

NCOSE's requests for improvement include:

- Redesign Chromebooks with a safety-first approach, including robust, default, and locked safety settings that limit internet access to vetted, educational, age-appropriate content.
- End exploitative data collection by halting student data harvesting without parental consent and ensuring full transparency and parental control over collected data.
- Implement hardware-level controls to block students from bypassing safety and school-administered restrictions.
- Enable effective offline functionality to reduce reliance on constant internet access and limit exposure to online risks.
- Simplify and improve administrative tools, making the Admin Console user-friendly with intuitive, standardized safety settings activated by default.

Advocacy

Communications Decency Act Section 230

Misinterpretations of Communications Decency Act (CDA) Section 230 have granted Big Tech blanket immunity for facilitating rampant sexual abuse and exploitation. The primary aim of the CDA's architects was to shield children from harmful content online. However, as a compromise on the then-emerging tech industry, Congress also included a special provision in the CDA—Section 230—to promote good-faith efforts to moderate harmful third-party content. Twitter's refusal to act in the case of John Doe and in numerous other CSAM cases exemplifies the dangers of this unchecked power.

The entire [Dirty Dozen list in 2025](#) was devoted to Section 230.

Meta Ordered to Pay \$375 Million After Enabling Child Exploitation

The same week the Dirty Dozen list was released, a jury in New Mexico ordered Meta to pay \$375 million in civil penalties after finding the company misled users about safety and enabled harm, including child sexual exploitation, on its platforms.

The ruling marks a pivotal moment in holding Big Tech accountable for prioritizing profit over children's safety and well-being. It is the first jury trial to find Meta liable for harm expedited by the design features and corporate decisions around the platform.

Meta has said it will appeal the ruling. However, the court rejected Meta's attempt to shield itself under Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act, emphasizing that the case focused on product design and corporate decisions and not just user content.

John Doe was 13 years old when he and a friend created explicit videos and sent them to an online perpetrator, who posed as a 16-year-old girl. Years later, these videos are on X and shared publicly. John contemplated suicide due to shame and bullying. John and his mother reported the videos to Twitter and asked that they be removed. Twitter responded that the content did not violate their policies, so it would not be removed. After thousands of views, they were taken down following an intervention by a federal agent who is a family friend.

Advocacy



Bark is a comprehensive parental control app and phone service designed to monitor online safety, allowing parents to track location, manage screen time, and filter content across texts, social media, and web browsing. It uses AI to scan for dangers like cyberbullying and pornography, sending alerts to parents.

Apple Still Refuses to Scan for Child Sexual Abuse Material

In December 2022, Apple abandoned survivors of child sexual abuse, leaving them to endure not only the initial trauma of the abuse but also knowing that the recordings of the crime continue to circulate on Apple's digital storage platforms. Each time these images or videos are viewed, survivors are re-victimized, forced to relive their abuse.

In February 2026, West Virginia's Attorney General, John B. McCuskey, filed a consumer protection lawsuit against Apple over its handling of child sexual abuse material on iCloud. The key allegations in the lawsuit include:

- Internal evidence cited includes a 2020 executive text suggesting Apple's privacy focus made it the "greatest platform for distributing child porn."
- Apple knowingly allows iCloud to serve as a platform for storing and sharing CSAM by refusing to deploy effective detection tools.
- Apple prioritizes its privacy branding and busin interests over child safety, using privacy as a "cloak" to avoid responsibilities to children and families.
- Apple's iCloud "reduces friction" for abusers by enabling easy access, search, and cross-device sharing of illegal material.
- Apple reports far fewer suspected CSAM instances to the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC) compared to peers (e.g., only 267 reports in 2023 vs. millions from Google/Meta).
- Apple abandoned its 2021 plan for NeuralHash (on-device CSAM scanning) due to privacy backlash, opting for less robust alternatives like Communication Safety (nudity warnings/blurring in Messages, etc.), which the suit calls inadequate compared to tools like Microsoft's PhotoDNA used by other companies.

Collective Shout

Collective Shout is a grassroots campaign movement against the objectification of women and the sexualization of girls.

Collective Shout is for anyone concerned about the increasing pornification of culture and the way its messages have become entrenched in mainstream society, presenting distorted and dishonest ideas about women and girls, sexuality and relationships.

Since their launch in 2010, Collective Shout has achieved many wins: billboards objectifying women pulled down, sexualized children's clothing withdrawn from sale, sexually violent games banned, Andrew Tate's pimping courses removed from Spotify, and an age verification trial underway to help protect kids from exposure to porn.

Apple: Stop Marketing Harmful Apps to Kids

Apple's App Store is failing to protect children, marketing harmful apps with misleading age ratings and inadequate parental controls. Apps labeled as safe for kids expose minors to grooming, sextortion, and explicit content, leaving parents with a false sense of security. Apple continues to prioritize profits over protection.

Tell Discord it's Time to PREVENT Sextortion

What started as a gamer chat app has become a pipeline for grooming, coercion, and sextortion. Predators lure minors from other platforms to Discord, using direct messenger, video calls, and private servers to escalate abuse and share child sexual abuse material. Organized sextortion networks even use Discord to recruit victims and coordinate crimes.

Despite being named five times on NCOSE's Dirty Dozen List, facing lawsuits, and testifying before lawmakers, Discord continues to rely on users to report abuse, leaving high-risk spaces largely unchecked.

Android

Android has the power to protect millions of minors worldwide with a single update. By implementing default safety features like nudity blurring and web content filtering at the OS level, Android can create a safer digital environment for children and teens. These protections are critical for minors who don't have the privilege of tech-savvy caregivers to configure safeguards manually.

Section 230

Mark Zuckerberg says “I’m sorry,” but his actions tell a different story. Under his leadership, Meta’s platforms—Facebook, Instagram, Messenger, and WhatsApp—have become breeding grounds for child sexual abuse, grooming, sextortion, and trafficking, prioritizing profits over safety. From algorithms recommending predators to teens to AI chatbots engaging in sexualized conversations with minors, Zuckerberg has consistently failed to protect children while allowing abuse to thrive unchecked.

Because of Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act, Meta and other Big Tech companies have escaped accountability too many times to count.

Steam

Steam, a popular gaming marketplace, hosts thousands of sexually explicit games, many of which normalize and encourage sexual violence. These games are accessible to children by default. Steam has no age verification to access adult games; users need only click a button confirming they are over 18. Further, even when parental controls are activated on a child’s account, the child can still watch previews to adult games—many of which are pornographic and sexually violent in themselves. For example, NCOSE researchers encountered previews for games that graphically depicted women being raped, whipped, and tortured.

Grok, xAI's chatbot, is normalizing sexual violence, exploitation, and abuse through its AI companions and image generators. These are intentional design choices to maximize profit at the expense of safety.

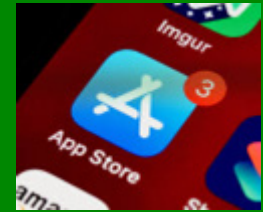
Google Chromebooks: Stop Putting Children At Risk for Abuse and Online Harms
